Our Fire Stations

The McHenry Township Fire Protection District is a 24 hour a day, 7 days a week operation responding from five stations to cover the district's 56 square miles. Each station is staffed by part-time personnel – trained as firefighters, paramedics and EMT's – that protect the approximately 65,000 residents.

In 2019, the McHenry Township Fire Protection District continued to respond to an increasing number of emergency calls -- relying on the focused and dedicated workforce of our trained and professional men and women. Although we have many seasoned professionals who have been with us for 20+ years, we continue in a cycle of hiring and training firefighters to meet our staffing needs. Recruiting and retaining personnel remains a challenge as we continue to operate as the largest part-time fire department in Illinois.

2019 Highlights

- Continue to be fiscally responsible by operating with 146 Part-Time Firefighters/Paramedics/EMT's
 - 32 Officers, 114 Firefighters
- Hired 25 New Part-Time Firefighters
- Implemented Lateral Hiring Program for Experienced Firefighters/Paramedics
- Completed Interior Remodel of Station 1 First remodel in 30 years including training room, day room and administrative offices.
- Instrumental in modifying final language of Senate Bill 37 that would have negatively affected the ability to maintain the MTFPD as a part-time fire department
- Promoted 1 Captain
- Promoted 1 Lieutenant
- MTFPD Fire Commission approved hiring six career lieutenants in 2020



More 2019 Highlights

- Participant in Part-Time Coalition and Shared Services Committee with neighboring fire departments to collaboratively save taxpayer dollars
- Station Alerting Faster more efficient dispatch improving apparatus response time
- For the first time, the MTFPD began hiring firefighter/paramedics from outside the district boundaries
- Completed an onboarding reference manual for new board of trustee members
- Involved with implementation of the 100 Club in McHenry County
- Purchased new personal protective equipment for firefighters and replaced 10 year old personal protective equipment
- Hosted an open house for retired members of MTFPD and dedicated statue at that event

2019 Statistics

5,877 Emergency Calls in 2019

- 66 calls were related to fires
- 15 were structure fires

4,516 Patients Were Treated

- 2,328 were advanced life support for critical patients
- 1,222 were basic life support for non life-threatening injuries
- Miscellaneous calls included activated fire alarms, downed power lines, activated CO detectors, car accidents, lift assists, odor investigations, water rescues and others.







Smoke Alarms In The Home

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom.
- Test alarms once a month and replace batteries every six months.
- Install on the ceiling or high on a wall
- Replace smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

Carbon Monoxide Safety

- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside bedrooms and on every level of the home.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries and replace. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location, call for help and stay outside until emergency personnel declare it safe to re-enter.
